



### **DEALING WITH BACK PAIN DURING THE MOLIDAYS**

Most of us who live on the Central Coast, do not have to worry much about straining our backs by shoveling snow but nevertheless we must be especially careful of our back during the holidays – lifting gifts that are too heavy, or carrying too many sacks of heavy groceries can easily strain one's back. Becoming stressed or depressed can also lead to back pain. If you have lower back pain, you are not alone. Back pain is the second most common neurological ailment in the United States — only headache is more common. Fortunately, most occurrences of low back pain go away within a few days. But some can take much longer to resolve or lead to more serious conditions.

Acute or short-term low back pain generally lasts from a few days to a few weeks. Most acute back pain is mechanical in nature — the result of trauma to the lower back or a disorder such as arthritis. Symptoms may range from muscle ache to shooting or stabbing pain, limited flexibility and/or range of motion, or an inability to stand straight. *Chronic* back pain is measured by duration — pain that persists for more than 3 months is considered chronic. It is often progressive and the cause can be difficult to determine.

Conditions that may cause low back pain and require treatment by a physician or other health specialist include: <u>Bulging disc</u> (also called protruding, herniated, or ruptured disc) when inter-vertebral discs are under constant pressure and as discs degenerate and weaken, cartilage can bulge or be pushed into the space containing the spinal cord or a nerve root, causing pain; <u>Sciatica</u> is a condition in which a herniated or ruptured disc presses on the sciatic nerve, the large nerve that extends down the spinal column to its exit point in the pelvis and carries nerve fibers to the leg. This compression causes shock-like or burning low back pain combined with pain through the buttocks and down one leg to below the knee; <u>Spinal degeneration</u> from disc wear and tear can lead to a narrowing of the spinal canal. A person with spinal degeneration may experience stiffness in the back upon awakening or may feel pain after walking or standing for a long time. <u>Osteoporosis</u> is a metabolic bone disease marked by progressive decrease in bone density and strength.

The best way to prevent back pain is to keep your back muscles strong. Exercise! Activities such as walking, swimming or biking can increase lower back muscle strength and endurance. Protect your back by sitting and standing up straight. Avoid heavy lifting. If you do lift something heavy, bend your legs and keep your back straight. If you are overweight, losing weight can put less strain on your back. Lift things with your legs, not your back. Keep your back straight and bend at the knees or at the hips. Get help if the load is too heavy for you to lift alone.

Here are some things you can do at home if you experience back pain: Keep moving. Ease back into your daily activities. Avoid activities that cause back pain. Apply cold, then heat to soothe sore and inflamed muscles. Use over-the-counter pain relievers help control pain. Most back pain disappears with home treatment and self-care. In rare cases, back pain can signal a serious medical problem and you should consult your doctor.

# **TRUSTEES REPORT**November '09

- Ted Sloan Jr. replaced some burnt out lights in the parking lot. He had to use a lift to do so. The Trustees are looking at renting or buying a used lift to replace the 40 foot extension ladder which the Trustees claimed to be unsafe at such a height. The lights in Criswell Hall and the Sanctuary are 25 to 40 feet up. Trees need to be trimmed and lights in the parking lot need to be changed from time to time. We could put a lift to work.
- The metal shed in the back has been sprayed once for spiders and will be sprayed again. After that it should be usable as a storage shed.
- The Ben Dohi family has been very generous and donated \$500 to the Memorial Fund.
- Betty Lorenz is still trying to line up a defibrillator class for a Saturday but that is not easy.
- It was mentioned that a French drain is still needed in the patio area.
- The 125<sup>th</sup> committee is looking for a 4 drawer filing cabinet to store archives. This will be placed in the McMillan Room.
- The Trustees have agreed to provide luminaries to light up the travel lanes for our upcoming Nativity Scene. This will take place on December 22 and 23 from 5:30 PM to 7 PM.
- It was also noted that some more research has to be done concerning the wall heater in one of the Children's Center's classroom. The wall heater can get hot to the touch.
- Monies from the Roy Collins Memorial Fund and the Murl Sloan Memorial Fund made the staining of the porticos possible. Money from the Bill Ford Memorial Fund made it possible to stain the doors.

### A Visit With Alice Addison by Michael Thurman

I first met Alice in August when she was invited by Barbara Reineke to join our church choir; we again got acquainted at Tom Egan's "portico painting" Saturday in October; and then I got drafted to interview her. What a "Forest Gump-ish" life she has had!

The newest member of the UMC of AG gravitated to Arroyo Grande from Washington, D.C. via Santa Barbara. The family in which Alice grew and flourished, provided leadership and encouragement, as

well as the opportunity to travel. We note here that her mother, a Pulitzer—Prize traveling scholar in journalism, was writing in Rio de Janerio where she met her future husband, John Adams. Alice's father became the CBS White House correspondent who predicted President Thurman's defeat of Dewey! Later with her journalist parents, covering the Berlin situation, Alice and family were in Berlin when the Berlin Wall went up on August 15, 1961.

As a high school student, Alice enjoyed the music of her church choir, the glee club, and folk singing club—and even got tickets to the first Beatles concert in D.C., "Ya, Ya, Ya!"

She was on the yearbook staff and carried on the family's journalistic traditions at the University of Santa Barbara editing for the yearbook committee, while studying Spanish and French. Later, received her bachelor's degree in history. She herself a master's from Pepperdine, and went on to graduate with honors in doctoral studies in Linguistics from Georgetown University.

Alice began her teaching career in Santa Barbara and continued on to Santa Maria High School, recently completing 31 years on the foreign language faculty. Her life has been enhanced by the following:

- 1. a fortunate marriage partner;
- 2. writing opportunities in D.C.,, working on the staff for a U.S. Senator, a magazine, and later editing and writing numerous articles for language journals, especially when serving as President of *Latesol*, the state English as a second language teacher's organization;
- 3. continual "living and learning" abroad, whereupon she mastered the language and culture of Mexico, Spain and France. Yes, Alice is tri-lingual.
- 4. local volunteerism with *Altrusa* (she is the former president) AAUW (also former president) and the South County Historical Society.
- 5. a wonderful teaching profession, receiving numerous awards, including teacher of the year honors, and grants.

## "Together We Can!"

Recently, I was handed a new UMC handbook titled: <u>The United Methodist</u> <u>Church - Making Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World—**Together we can!**</u>

After sorting through its 46 pages, I discovered it to be a resourceful full-colored booklet with many explicit photos and a spiritual storyline depicting an inspiring review of Methodists. It illustrated the church uniting on a mission to follow Jesus Christ and transform the world. I would like to share with you a few excerpts from this multipurpose publication developed as a communications tool to strengthen our ministry.

The greatest expression of Jesus Christ is to follow Him wherever He wants us to go. That is how we discover hope. We lay down priorities of the day; see through the distractions of this world and follow. (Jesus taught that lesson in John 21: 15-19. He asked his loyal disciple, Simon, son of John, "do you know me?" When Simon Peter assured Jesus the answer was "yes," Jesus instructed him, "Follow me." -John 21:19b NRSV)

In the defining words of UMC Bishop Gregory V. Palmer, President, and Council of Bishops – "our church has taken bold steps to help us all align around our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." We strive to make a difference as we: A) <u>develop principled Christian leaders for the church and the world</u>, B) <u>create new places for new people and renew existing congregations</u>, C) <u>engage in ministry with the poor</u>, and D) <u>stamp out the killer diseases of poverty by improving health globally</u>.

Bishop Palmer is confident that if we robustly engage in these four areas of focus, we will renew the church in gospel faithfulness, deepen our sense of connection, and join God in transforming this world.

#### Stamping Out the Killer Diseases of Poverty by Improving Health Globally

When people regain health, lives change. This focus area calls United Methodists to reverse the greatest damage caused by poverty, **disease**. It urges us to ease the pain and suffering of the world's poor and those without access to affordable health care as a powerful, tangible method of witnessing to God's desire that all should experience life abundantly and flourish. This allows us to create a sense of uniting purpose for United Methodists the world over.

Methodist founder John Wesley felt passionately about the value of ministry to the poor. He taught in his 1741 Primitive Physic, among other teachings, that health and wholeness are matters of spiritual concern.

#### Our People

United Methodists are, by design, a people dedicated to a life of Christian purpose – **Do No Harm – Do Good – Stay In Love With God.** We are to live a life of participation and personal responsibility of generosity, sacrifice and self-restraint, in response to the call of Jesus Christ. We open our hearts, our minds and our doors in answer to the call of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. We believe that the church is the body of Christ; an extension of Christ's life and ministry in the world today. Methodists believe the church is communion with saints, a community made up of past, present and future disciples of Christ. We believe that the church is called to worship God and to support those who participate in life as they grow in faith.
