Western Jurisdiction College of Bishops offer message of hope

The Western Jurisdiction's College of Bishops offers a video reflection on Epiphany and the baptism of Christ which speaks to the Church's calling to illuminate God's revelation in Jesus and to live into family as God defines it.

As The United Methodist Church approaches a special called session of its General Conference in February, the bishops also remind us of God's faithfulness and of the Church's enduring work. They reflect on the family that God has created and the sacred worth of each person. Looking ahead to the February General Conference, Bishop Minerva Carcaño shares that she has, "no doubt that we will have a God sent epiphany at the General Conference – that God will be with us, because God is ever faithful."

The 32-member Commission was authorized by General Conference 2016 and appointed by the Council of Bishops to examine paragraphs in The Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and exploring options to strengthen the unity of the church.

This article is a summation of several articles that have appeared recently in the United Methodist news.

"Seeing a Way Forward"
2019 Special Session of the General Conference

The Council of Bishops has called a special session of the General Conference — set for Feb. 23-26 in St. Louis — to attempt to find common ground on the issue of same-sex marriage and ordination of homosexuals.

Currently the Book of Discipline states that the practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching and that "self-avowed practicing homosexuals" cannot be clergy. The Discipline also bans ceremonies that celebrate same-sex unions in United Methodist church. Despite these rules, same-gender weddings have been performed in United Methodist churches and by United Methodist clergy. Clergy have publicly declared they are gay, sometimes losing their credentials.

The purpose of the special session will be to receive and act on a report from the Commission on a Way Forward based on the recommendations of the Council of Bishops. The 32-member Commission was authorized by General Conference 2016 and appointed by the Council of Bishops to examine paragraphs in The Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and exploring options to strengthen the unity of the church.

The Bishops nominated and selected 32 members to serve on the Commission, focusing on a diverse body that represents our global church. In the Commission there are persons from nine countries with a variety of theological perspectives. The Commission is one third laity, one third clergy, and one third bishops and includes younger persons, gay persons, professors, administrators, pastors, youth ministers, campus ministers, lay leaders, large church pastors, and persons identified with renewal and advocacy groups. There is Korean, Hispanic, African-American, Filipino, European, and African representation. Our Cal-Pac bishop, Grant Hagiya, is a member of the Commission.

Three plans have been proposed by the Commission:

- The One Church Plan would shift to churches and conferences decisions regarding
 ministry with or by LGBTQ persons rather than maintaining a single standard that
 operates throughout the worldwide church. It would also remove some of the
 language in the Book of Discipline that limit LGBTQ people's involvement as
 United Methodists.
- The <u>Connectional Conference Plan</u> would create three connectional conferences based on perspective on LGBTQ issues. The three connectional conferences would

function throughout the worldwide church and the five existing U.S. jurisdictions would be abolished.

• <u>The Traditional Plan</u> would affirm the current language about homosexuality in the Book of Discipline and seek to strengthen enforcement for violations.

Since this report was made in May, 2018 two other plans - "The Simple Plan" and the "Modified Traditional Plan" have been submitted.

- <u>The Simple Plan</u> would remove all language from the Book of Discipline that excludes LGBTQ people from full participation in the church.
- <u>The Modified Traditional Plan</u> would add to the Traditional Plan a committee with authority to hold bishops accountable to the sexuality standards in the Book of Discipline. It would offer a \$200,000 grant to annual conferences that want to leave the denomination because of disagreement over LGBTQ issues.

The Council of Bishops (COB) has voted by an overwhelming majority to share the work done by the Commission on a Way Forward on the five plans and to recommend the One Church Plan. The One Church Plan will be placed before the General Conference for legislative action. The Council of Bishops said in recommending the One Church Plan that it provides conferences, churches and pastors the flexibility to pursue their mission while retaining the connectional nature of the church. The plan leaves decisions of whether to allow same-gender weddings up to local churches and gay ordination up to annual conferences.

"The question is, 'Can we continue to be a one church denomination which allows us to have ministry in Liberia and the Philippines and in Europe and in the United States?'" said Bishop Kenneth H. Carter Jr., president of the Council of Bishops. "We are not a small denomination with one ethnicity, with one political perspective, with one theological perspective. We're a global church on four continents. And what is compelling to me about the One Church Plan is that it does create a home for the people who are now in The United Methodist Church."

Although the issue of homosexuality in the church is important, other challenges are arguably more pressing, said Urs Schweizer, assistant to Bishop Patrick Streiff in central and southern Europe. Among those issues are sharing faith in post-modern and highly secularized societies, migration, breakdown of families, consumer society and poverty.

"The most important aim (at the special session) is to find a way that does not create winners and losers, does not allow some to stay in the United Methodist Church while encouraging others to leave," Schweizer said. "Many United Methodists in central and southern Europe would rather focus on staying together as one church, as diverse as we may be on some ethical issues."


VOLUNTEERS REQUESTED FOR VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL BY CAROLYN RUSSELL

GOD'S STEADFAST LOVE...IN ACTION

1. HISTORY OF METHODIST MISSION

This month we continue the series on the history of Methodist mission. The three earliest efforts for Methodist education were Kingswood School in Great Britain, Cokesbury School in the United States, and the Sunday school movements in both countries. They focused on domestic groups, especially the children of the poor, and all three reflect the missional nature of early Methodism. Methodism began as a reform movement intended to revive the Church of England.

John Wesley gave close attention to evangelizing the poor and working classes who were generally ignored by the Anglican church establishment. Innovations such as field-preaching and small groups effectively engaged these neglected groups.

While early American Methodism developed outside the Anglican establishment, the movement there also stayed close to the poor and working classes in focus, message, and organization.

In both countries, the Methodist gospel of free grace and the Methodist pattern of disciplined, holy living were particularly appealing to those on the margins looking to move up in society. In this context, Methodists understood mission in a holistic way. They focused on personal religious conversion, but that conversion accompanied the adoption of disciplined personal habits that led to greater individual prosperity. Wesley and his followers believed that changes in individual religion, morals, and economic behavior would ultimately lead to improvements in society as a whole.
